#### Winter Gardening

Winter months in our gardens always bring a little sadness. Everything or most things look dead because they are! However, it's a great time to study the "nakedness" of our landscapes. Winter provides a bare-boned perspective which allows us to rethink some of our plantings, their locations, color and size, as well as the hardscapes.

Some plants that provide great interest in winter include Windmill Palms, Weeping Mulberry and Harry Lauder's Walking Stick. They are especially interesting when covered with snow. The palm fronds wave in the wind, the weeping limbs of the Mulberry resemble chandeliers, and the Walking Stick is just plain awesome with its upward twisting limbs that look like fireworks! Placing these alone as specimen plantings gives them the attention they deserve.

Don't forget about deciduous plants that provide beautiful color like a Red Twig Dogwood. Colorful plants like this are magnificent in winter when planted en masse.

New perspectives in the garden are good. They afford us the opportunity to see things in a new way. In life, new perspectives afford us the opportunity to adjust our attitudes and move on, and winter is a great time to do all of that.

#### June 2019 SCMG Trip to Tulsa, Oklahoma

Our trip committee is planning a Master Gardener trip to Tulsa June 6<sup>th</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup>. Planned stops include the Native American Museum in Tahlequah, the Woody Guthrie Center, Tulsa Botanic Garden, and the Southwood Garden Center.



Friday, June 7<sup>th</sup>, we will visit the Gilcrease Museum (gilcrease.org), former home of oilman and Creek native, Thomas Gilcrease. Established in 1955, the museum has a large collection of American West paintings, sculpture, and native American artifacts as well as 23 acres of gardens that reflect the American West periods: Pre-Columbian, Pioneer, Colonial, and Victorian. Friday evening we head to Woody Guthrie Center and Guthrie Green, dedicated to the life and legacy of American folk musician, social activist, and singer/songwriter Woody Guthrie, a native son of Oklahoma. Guthrie Green was formerly a site of urban decay but has been revamped into a park, entertainment space, shops, and restaurants.

During our trip, the Arkansas Travelers will be playing the Tulsa Drillers at Oneok Field.
